

ADK Fire Tower Challenge for an AUTUMN VIEW

Adirondack Fire Towers were once essential for forest safety and conservation. After the Great Fires of 1903 and 1908, which devastated over one million acres of forest preserve, a more effective system for managing wildfire detection and public safety became necessary. Built in the early 20th century, these towers allowed observers to spot wildfires before they could spread, helping to protect the region's vast forests. As fire detection methods advanced, many towers were decommissioned, but today, they stand as historic landmarks and popular hiking destinations, offering stunning panoramic views of the Adirondack landscape. Preserving these structures honors the region's conservation history and provides a unique opportunity for visitors to connect with the past.

Today, the Adirondack Mountain Club and the Glens Falls/Saratoga Chapter work together to sponsor the Fire Tower Challenge, which encourages participants to explore a variety of regions throughout the Adirondack and Catskill Parks. This popular hiking challenge invites outdoor enthusiasts to experience the rich history and beautiful views of these areas by hiking to the summits of at least 23 fire tower peaks—18 in the Adirondack Park and 5 in the Catskill Park. The challenge promotes adventure and physical activity while highlighting the critical role fire towers have played in forest conservation and public safety. It also includes a stewardship component,



reinforcing one of the core tenets of the Adirondack Mountain Club's mission.

Upon completion, hikers can apply for a certificate, patch, and recognition from ADK, making it a rewarding way to experience the diverse landscapes and heritage of the region. The challenge can be completed in any season, with an optional winter challenge that requires summits to be reached between December 21 and March 21. Whether tackling it in warmer months or braving the winter conditions, the Fire Tower Challenge is a meaningful way to engage with many regions throughout New York States Forest Preserves.

The Adirondack Fire Tower Challenge will celebrate its 25^{th} anniversary in 2026 with over 2,500 completers so far – are you ready to be the next? 

ANNUAL BLACK RIVER WATERSHED CONFERENCE

Monday, June 3rd. The 15th Annual Black River Watershed Conference was held from 9:00 AM—4:00 PM at the Hilton Garden Inn Watertown. Both Caryn Clements and Rich Ross attended. The theme was "Exploring Our Watershed: Insights, Innovations, and Action".

This year's conference updated stakeholders living and working in the 5 counties and over 60 communities in the watershed on topics including soil and water conservation district updates from Lewis, Jefferson, Oneida, Hamilton, and Herkimer counties, culvert replacements by Trout Unlimited, Black River Watershed water quality sampling results from the

Upstate Freshwater Institute, invasive species updates from the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets, and regional winter climate analysis from the NYS Tug Hill Commission. The last event of the conference included a feature an interactive session to collaborate on ideas, projects, challenges, and solutions in the watershed.

The Black River Watershed Conference allows citizens, local leaders, and other stake-



holders from local government, conservation, and agencies to come together and discuss opportunities to protect our environment, enhance recreational opportunities, and manage developing issues within the watershed. The conference is part of outreach efforts originating from the Black River Watershed Plan.

MOUNT MARCY: A HIKE TO REMEMBER

Monday, July 14, On a crisp Monday morning, five hikers set out to conquer Mount Marcy, the tallest peak in New York State. With 14.8 miles of trail ahead and over 3,000 feet of elevation gain, the group departed from the ADK High Peaks Information Center with high spirits at about 7:30 am, sturdy boots, and a shared sense of adventure.

The trail to Marcy is known for its beauty and its challenge—and it delivered both in full. Early stretches offered peaceful forest paths and glimpses of distant ridgelines. As the group ascended, the terrain grew steeper and more rugged, demanding focus and stamina. With the threat of an oncoming storm, the weather held steady, providing ideal conditions for the day.

But as every seasoned hiker knows, the mountain doesn't always yield easily. One member of the group became unable to complete their 3rd trip to the summit and made the wise decision to turn back, prioritizing safety. The remaining four hikers pressed on, reaching the peak and soaking in the panoramic views from 5,344 feet above sea level. On the decent, one hiker twisted his knee which slowed his return till almost dark.

Though not all reached the summit, the day was a success in every meaningful way. It was a reminder that hiking is not just about the destination—it's about the journey, the camaraderie, and the resilience we discover in ourselves and each other. Eve-



ry member of the group contributed to the spirit of the day, and each step—whether on the ascent or the return—was part of a shared story.

We extend our gratitude to our Level 3 trip leader for ensuring a safe and well-organized experience, and to all participants for their enthusiasm, grit, and good humor.

LOON COUNTING AT STAR LAKE

Saturday, **July 19th**, A fantastic day to kayak and count loons. We had a total of 4 people. Launched about 7:50am and saw our first look at 8:05. The count is only from 8am to 9am and in that time we saw a total of 4 loons. 2 in the lake and 2 flying overhead ultimately finding a spot on the lake. At 9:10 we spotted 2 more loons but unfortunately could not be included in our count. Great kayaking weather too!

PIERCEFIELD FLOW PADDLE

Wednesday, July 23rd, This paddle was postponed but a timeframe became available and I just went for it! Three of us paddled on another gorgeous day. We paddled to the end and then back around by the shoreline. Paddle was lovely, however my group likes to swim and the flow was so full of milfoil that it was unfeasible. The flow is choked with milfoil and 75% of the flow has extremely low oxygen levels. This is a good time to remind everyone to wash their boat after each paddle. This lake is pretty much dead and cannot be revived without enormous funding and dedication by each and every paddler.

Saturday, **August 9**th, We couldn't have asked for a better day to explore the historic Black River Feeder Canal Trail. With beautiful scenery and a smooth dirt path, the route offered a peaceful and enjoyable ride alongside the canal's gentle flow.

Four of us set off around 9:15 AM from the covered bridge in Erwin Park, Boonville, riding a trail well-suited for gravel, hybrid, and electric bikes. Along the way, we appreciated thoughtful trail markings—white paint for minor rock protrusions and red for more significant obstacles—helping riders navigate safely




We crossed about 8 roads; Sargent Road, the Moose River Road, Hayes
Road, Hawkinsville Road, then Williams Road, Millers Woods Road Edmonds Road. Wildlife added to the charm, with
ducks and deer calmly observing our passage. We paused a couple of times to regroup and enjoy the surroundings.

By 11:15 AM, we reached the end of the trail and headed toward the Forestport Diner, hoping for a bite—but they were just closing. Instead, we found a shady spot and enjoyed a quiet lunch together before beginning the return trip.

One rider noted we were following the river's flow and predicted a downhill ride back. While the elevation change was a modest 67 feet, a refreshing breeze made the return especially pleasant. We arrived back at the covered bridge around 3:15 PM, tired but satisfied after completing the 9.8-mile round-trip.

The packed dirt surface made for a smooth ride, ideal for both seasoned cyclists and those newer to longer distances. It was a day of camaraderie, nature, and gentle adventure—one we'll surely remember. Afterwards, we did go to the Boonville Hotel for a lunch.
